Adult Summer Reading Program



Mike Bent's Abrakidabra!



The Other Family Doctor
A Veterinarian Explores What Animals
Can Teach Us about
Love, Life, and Mortality
By Karen Fine, DVM

Available in print format as well as audiobook.

The Other Family Doctor is a beautifully written, sensitive but objective account of the world of a veterinarian. Author Dr. Karen Fine is a holistic veterinarian who is fascinated by the relationship between animals and their humans. She shares both joyful and heartbreaking tales of veterinary practice; her various stories of both patients and her own pets explore animal and human connections.

Dr. Fine chronicles the beginning of her private house-call practice, where she is both a veterinarian and a business owner, performing many tasks associated with each role. She discusses wellness visits; the importance of preventative care; and caring for sick, injured or terminally ill pets. She also discusses making the difficult decision to euthanize a suffering animal, and coping with the grief and guilt that often accompany such a decision, one that can be very traumatic for the owner <u>and</u> the veterinarian.

To increase her array of available treatment options, Dr. Fine practices a combination of conventional Western and traditional Chinese medicine, including animal acupuncture and the use of herbal remedies.

Dr. Fine also notes the unusually high suicide rate among veterinarians, citing both animals and people in crisis. She believes both ethical and psychological issues can be contributing factors to the stress of the profession.

Caring for the animals in our lives teaches us about life and love. The book is a tribute to the animals that enrich our lives. Dr. Fine operated her house-call practice for twenty-five years in central Massachusetts. She is currently an associate veterinarian at Central Animal Hospital in Leominster, Massachusetts.

Art Exhibits in the Program Room

Throughout the year, the Gale Free Library will be displaying the artwork of a variety of artists. In July, we welcome photographer Vern McClish's late uncle, George Ludway, a cartoon artist who turned to watercolor landscapes in retirement, and left a large collection to his nieces and nephews. Ludway was a full-time artist who, after serving his country as a pilot in WWII, returned home to practice and refine his talent as an artist. For many years after the war Ludway made his living by creating and selling cartoons to magazines like "Field and Stream" and the "New Yorker." At seventy-five years old, he decided to paint watercolors. His nickname was "Shanty" because he loved to make paintings of small shanties around Lake Erie. Local History and Museum Highlights

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The GFL Local History Room

Many of the paper documents in the Local History Room (LHR) were written with a dip pen and either iron-gall or aniline-dye ink. To protect the documents from the many harms of repeated handling, we make typescripts of their handwritten texts, which is not an easy process. To modern eyes, the range of personal and taught styles of cursive (script) handwriting employed in the 19th Century-- characterized by loops, pothooks, and other flourishes--can be challenging to read. Two volunteers in LHR are currently engaged in creating a typescript of the first ledger of minutes of the Damon Memorial's Board of Trustees. In certain instances, such as "translating" someone else's handwriting, two heads definitely prove better than one!

Boston Children's Museum (seasonal)

Coupon admits up to 4 people at half price Wednesday - Sunday. (Note: Boston Children's Museum requires online booking.)

Davis Farmland (seasonal)

Pass admits up to 4 guests with a savings of \$5 off the online rate. (purchase at the gate; all parties must include a child 12 and under)

Discovery Museum

Pass admits up to 3 people at half price.

Ecotarium

Coupon admits 2 adults and 2 children (in one vehicle) at half price. Children under 2 admitted free.

Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum

Coupon admits up to 4 people at \$5 each. Children under 18 admitted free.

(Note: Admission for the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum must be booked online 48 hours in advance!)

Mass. State Park Parking Pass

Pass provides free parking for one vehicle (excluding buses or vans) at over 50 Mass State Parks facilities that charge a daily parking fee.

Museum of Fine Arts Boston

Coupon admits up to 2 people for \$10 each. Children 6 and under admitted free.

(Note: The MFA coupon passes require online advance booking.)

Native Plant Trust / Garden in the Woods (seasonal)

Two passes available each day. Each pass admits 1 adult at half price and one child (3–17) at \$1.



New England Aquarium

Coupon admits up to 4 people at half price.

Old Sturbridge Village

Pass admits up to 4 people at half off daytime admission. Children 2 and under free.

New England Botanic Garden at Tower Hill

Pass admits up to 4 people at half price. Children under 3 admitted free.

Trustees GO Pass

Pass admits 2 adults and 2 children at the equivalent admission price of a Trustees Family Membership.

USS Constitution Museum

Pass admits up to 9 people free.

Worcester Art Museum

Pass admits up to 2 people at half price. (Note: Not accepted at Flora or special events.)

Worcester Historical Museum

Pass admits up to 2 adults and 4 children free.
