Be on the Lookout for...

"Windows of Opportunity"



Praised as "The Gem of Worcester County" on its completion in 1888, Gale Free Library, also known as the Damon Memorial, still sparkles in the town center of Holden, Massachusetts. A grand Romanesque Revival building, the library was given a major makeover and a modern addition in 1989. However, the original windows were only maintained at that time, not replaced; they're essentially unchanged since 1888.

Library and town officials agree it's time to fully restore these beautiful architectural features. "Windows of Opportunity," a fundraising campaign led by the Friends of Gale Free Library, aims to help out by raising \$200,000 toward the total restoration and repair of the 60 exterior windows in the original Damon Memorial building.

According to a commissioned study from the Boston architectural firm SOCOTEC, the carpentry costs are expected to total \$750,000, plus additional project expenses. The Friends campaign will provide a portion of the total costs, with the balance coming from potential grants as well as town appropriations. The goal is to preserve and protect the historic character of a truly unique building.

Says Library Director Susan Scott, "Those windows are an integral part of the architecture and of the experience of using this inspiring space. You could say we want to add new luster to this 'Gem of Worcester County.'"

Local History and Museum Highlights

Local History

As mentioned in last month's "Bookmark," essays involving the plaster busts and statues that were once part of Holden High School appeared occasionally in the school's newspaper-yearbook, "The Clarion." The following flight-of-fancy was published in the May, or Senior, issue for 1925:

A Midnight Excursion of 1950

Slumbering peacefully one winter's night I was suddenly awakened by the sound of a clear voice. I opened my eyes and beheld a mysterious visitor. She commanded me to arise and follow her. Hastily dressing, I obeyed her summons.

On a blackboard I now espy the word "Exam." Of course we used to hate exams. Yet it is almost with a thrill of pleasure that I recall the stress and strain and excitement, the hopes and fears. My mouth waters. Why is that? Hot dog! That is it! How delicious those hot dogs tasted between examinations!

Another notice attracts my attention: A "Prom." What a host of memories come back to me: the old town hall [gaily] decorated in the blue and silver; lively music; bright dresses; happy faces!

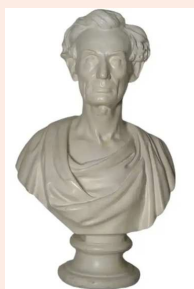

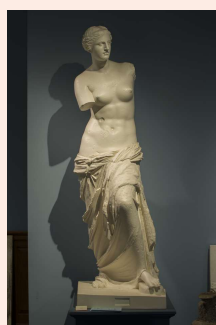
