Local History



Travelling Back to 1944

Following Librarian M. Addie Holden's retirement from the Gale Free Library in 1943, the Damon Memorial Board of Trustees elected to have a representative of the State Division of Public Libraries, a part of the Massachusetts Department of Education, survey the Library for the

benefit of the Town, Trustees, and new Librarian, Amy L. Snow. What follows, and will continue to be presented in future issues of the "Bookmark" until complete, is the submitted report, written by Library Adviser E. Louise Jones and dated April 13, 1944. Note that the format of the report has been altered slightly to improve readability, and a few non-essential lines, omitted.



The survey is in no sense a reflection on any past management. Every library has to consider changes to meet the varied trends in the development of library service throughout the country. We wish to express our appreciation of the excellent work accomplished by your former librarian, Mrs. Holden, during her many years of faithful service. The recommendations are given as an aid in constructive plans for future development of the library. The extension of the activities of the library is dependent largely on the command of more liberal financial resources. There are, however, improvements that may be carried out with little expense that will add materially to the efficiency of the service. The recommendations in this survey are made both for definite immediate and future needs.

The standards set by the Massachusetts Division of Public Libraries, the Massachusetts Library Association, and the American Library Association are standards to be considered in developing library service. Also comparisons made with records of the past and with statistics of other libraries of similar size and conditions are of value in showing whether or not the library has improved or remained static. The minimum standard income per capita recommended by the above is \$1.50 per capita for towns the size of Holden (income per capita for Holden in 1943 was 67¢). The minimum standard for circulation of books is 10 per capita (Holden 3.2 per capita). The minimum standard for hours open per week is 24 (Holden 15).

Many ideas have developed in library procedure since the library was recataloged thirty-seven years ago, and our recommendations include some of the shortcuts and modern methods, especially in connection with cataloging, classification, and methods of keeping records.





Author Spotlight

Lilac Girls

Published 2016

Kelly's debut novel is rich with detail and inspired by true events. This story of three women during WWII reveals bravery, cowardice, and cruelty that should never be forgotten. The story takes place in Ravensbruck, which was an all-women concentration camp in Northern Germany. Most of the prisoners were Polish women, who endured horrific medical experiments conducted by Herta Oberheuser, the only female doctor brought to trial for war crimes after WWII.

Lost Roses

Published 2019

The second book in the series features Caroline Ferriday's mother, Eliza, a New York socialite, Sofya, a Russian aristocrat, and Varinka, a Russian peasant. Set a generation earlier (the novel is a prequel to *Lilac Girls*), *Lost Roses* follows three interesting, strong, and yet very different women from St. Petersburg, Russia to Paris under the shadow of WWI. It is a journey through privilege and poverty in which all three women are willing to take risks to ensure their survival.

Sunflower Sisters

Published 2021

The third book in the series (a prequel to *Lost Roses*) is about Ferriday's ancestor Georgeanna Woolsey, a union nurse during the Civil War. She crosses paths with a young enslaved girl, Jemma, on the Peeler Plantation, and Anne-May who is forced to run the Peeler Plantation when her husband enlists in the Union Army and her brother joins the Confederates. Inspired by true events, it's a story of a country on the verge of collapse that deals with nationalism and racial cruelty.

Kelly's latest book, *The Golden Doves*, published in 2023, is the riveting story of two brave women, American Josie Anderson and Parisian Arlette LaRue, who are working in the French resistance and stealing so many Nazi secrets they become known as the Golden Doves. Eventually they are arrested and imprisoned in Ravensbruck, a concentration camp that housed only female prisoners. The Nazi doctors at the prison performed unspeakable medical experiments on the prisoners. A decade later Josie Anderson is working for U.S. Army Intelligence. Once again she and Arlette LaRue embark together on a journey across Europe and to French Guiana, discovering a web of terrible secrets. This is the unforgettable story about the fates of Nazi fugitives after WWII.
