Local History Addendum

Local History



Did you know that five different histories of the Town of Holden have been published thus far, beginning in 1841? To introduce our patrons to these histories, Local History plans to present excerpts from each book in the current and several subsequent issues of "The Bookmark." Copies of all five histories can be checked out from the Library.

Excerpts from D. F. Estes' The History of Holden, Massachusetts, 1684-1894, cont'd.

"There are several villages in town [in 1894] which have received special designations, in some cases more than one. The name Holden belongs pre-eminently to the old central village, sometimes called the 'Center.' Jefferson (earlier Jeffersonville) now includes Eagleville, often familiarly called 'Brick City' on account of a brick house which was long the only brick building in town. Quinapoxet village and post-office lies [sic] at the distance of perhaps half a mile from the railroad station of that name, [lying between the station and] the smaller village which bears the names of Lovellville and Centerville. Quinapoxet is often colloquially styled 'French Woods,' on account of the large tract of woodland in the neighborhood, [sic] at one time owned by citizens of France. Unionville lies to the south, and nearer the center [of] the town. The little village in the northern part of the town claims the name of Ruralville, though it is usually spoken of as 'North Woods,' a name which the railroad station bears. The railroad stations toward Worcester from the Center are Dawsons and Chaffins, Dawsonville and Chaffinville lying a little way respectively to the west and to the east of the track. Bryantville lies close to the east of the Dawsons station."

"At the annual town meeting, March 21st, 1887, the committee, which had been chosen the preceding November to investigate the matter of additional school accommodation [sic] at the Center, presented to the town the following letter:

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'Minneapolis, March 15, 1887.

"Maj. Isaac Damon, Holden, Mass.

"Dear Sir: I have delayed sending to you my final decision in the matter of the public building to be erected on the Chenery lot, until I could look up the subject thoroughly. In accordance with your suggestion, your High School Principal has written a full and satisfactory letter touching the needs of the High School.

"I am now able to say, that, unless prevented by some misfortune, I shall commence the present season to erect upon the Chenery lot a building adapted to both High School and Library purposes. I design to have the walls completed and the roof on before next winter, and have the same fully completed ready for occupancy as early as September, 1888.

"This building and ground, together with some books, which we hope to add, my wife and I will present to the Town of Holden as a free gift, subject only to some simple and reasonable conditions as to care and support of the structure and its equipment on the part of the town. "I write this letter now, that the people of the town may have assurance that both School and Library accommodations will be provided for without any steps being taken by the town at its coming meeting.

"Yours very Sincerely, "Samuel C. Gale."

Author Spotlight Abby Jimenez

Abby Jimenez is a New York Times bestselling romance author who resides near Minneapolis, Minnesota, with her husband, three daughters, and four dogs. She writes heartwarming, laugh-out-loud romance novels, numbering two series and several stand-alone titles.

She is the founder of Nadia Cakes bakery, which is mentioned several times in the books, and the winner of numerous "Food Network" competitions with an international following. Her next book to be released in March is titled *The Fall Risk*.

"PART OF YOUR WORLD" SERIES

Part of Your World / Yours Truly / Just for the Summer

In the first novel, *Part of Your World*, readers get caught up in a modern-day, fairy-tale romance on the first page. Alexis Montgomery was born into an ultra-rich family of surgeons, and she is expected to continue the family legacy. Her world is turned upside down when she meets Daniel Grant, an easy-on-the-eyes carpenter who lives in a small town in Minnesota. There is a mutual chemistry, but she can't bring Daniel into her world and believes his world is too small for her. There is always a bigger theme in Jimenez's novels--physical, mental, emotional, and domestic abuse are interwoven throughout. Eventually, Alexis discovers what is important in life, and there is plenty of laughter to be found between the pages.

In the second installment of the series, *Yours Truly*, Dr. Briana Ortez's life is definitely in a downward spiral. She is recently divorced, her brother is in renal failure and waiting for a kidney donor, and the promotion she was expecting has been delayed. When Briana meets a new physician, Dr. Jacob Maddox, working in the ER, she expects to dislike him but soon discovers the opposite. Dr. Maddox has recently ended a relationship with his girlfriend, started a new job, and struggles with chronic social anxiety which is heightened by new unfamiliar situations. Jacob writes a letter to Briana thanking her for the suggestion to provide cupcakes to win over the staff. Soon they are both exchanging letters and getting to know each other. This slow-burning romance is about second chances, friendship, and meaningful relationships.

Just for the Summer is the third book in the series. Justin and Emma both believe they are cursed. Each believes that after four dates, a kiss, and a breakup, their dates go on to meet their soulmates. They decide they will date each other to cancel out their curses and perhaps meet their soulmates. It's supposed to be a summer fling! Then Emma's toxic mother shows up unexpectedly and Justin assumes guardianship for his siblings. Despite all of life's challenges, maybe fate has brought the perfect couple together.
