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

"Try Neurographics! Meditative Art-Making"

Join us for a simple, inviting approach to drawing. No advanced skills needed! If you can hold a pen, you can make neurographic artwork. Neurographics is a mindful, intuitive way of sitting with a question or an intention, then turning it into art. Developed by a psychologist and used in many creative-therapy practices around the world, the lines and markmaking mimic neuropathic synapses, allowing the mark-maker to relax and settle the mind while the subconscious works itself out. You'll leave with an original piece of art, which you can choose to leave black and white or make colorful! You'll also leave with a meditative practice that you can use anytime you need it, right at home.



Local History



Did you know that five different histories of the Town of Holden have been published thus far, beginning in 1841? To introduce our patrons to these histories, Local History plans to present excerpts from each book in the current and several subsequent issues of "The Bookmark." Copies of all five histories can be checked out from the Library.

Excerpts from S. C. Damon's

The History of Holden, Massachusetts, 1667-1841, cont'd.

"The dividing line between North [eventually Holden] and South Worcester was drawn during the year 1683 or 4. [However, between 1686 and 1713] . . . very meagre records have been preserved relating to the North half of Worcester.

[Then--]

"An incident occurred [in the] Spring of 1723, . . . Mr. Jonas Rice, a citizen of South Worcester, had discovered limestone* upon the farm, now known by the name of the Rullard Farm

". . . A settlement was made in the immediate neighborhood of the lime lot, which is supposed to be the FIRST SETTLEMENT in Holden. The remains of lime kilns still appear about 60 rods south of Timothy Parker's house.

"The records of the proprietors of the common and undivided lands in North and South Worcester, indicate that vigorous exertions were made on their part to promote the rapid settlement [of the "Lime Lot" area], immediately subsequent to the incorporation of Worcester.

"Near 4000 acres of land, in North Worcester, were transferred from company stock to private individuals. . . . To facilitate settlements and raise the value of landed property, the proprietors appointed a committee to lay out four public roads, 6 rods wide, from the centre of North Worcester, in such ways as would be most serviceable to the said half part and the towns adjoining.

"... At a general meeting of the citizens of North and South Worcester, held March 3, 1740, it was voted, that the North half part of the township be set off a distinct and separate town The Act passed the General Court, January 2, and was signed by His Excellency, Governor Belcher, Jan. 9, 1741, and in the 14th year of the reign of George II.

"When this Act had passed the General Court, the North half of Worcester became a distinct and separate town, 'by the name of Holden, with all the powers, privileges, and immunities which the inhabitants of other towns within this Province do, and by law ought to enjoy.""

*Limestone was an extremely valuable material for both construction and agriculture from the 18th through the early 20th centuries.





The Worcester Talking Book Library

The Library's Reference staff recently had the pleasure of hosting a representative from the Worcester Talking Book Library (WTBL), an acces-



sibility service of the Worcester Public Library. We were amazed at the plentiful and creative services the WTBL offers to qualifying Massachusetts residents of any age who struggle with traditional print materials because of a visual, physical, or reading disability. Among the services are

- access to audiobooks through easy-to-use equipment or the BARD app, which can be installed on your own mobile device;
- large-print books for all ages;
- audio-described DVDs;
- programs and workshops (recent programs include "Birding By Ear," as well as live music and audio-described movie events);
- children's services, including access to Wonderbooks;
- Dial-A-Story;
- a public space at the Worcester Public Library's Main Branch that includes accessible computer stations;

and much more!

Most items can be shipped right to you via mail, with return postage included. **All services and resources are provided free of charge** thanks to funding from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and materials supplied by the National Library Service.
