

Local History



Did you know that five different histories of the Town of Holden have been published thus far, beginning in 1841? To introduce our patrons to these histories, Local History plans to present excerpts from each book in the current and several subsequent issues of "The Bookmark." Copies of all five histories can be checked out from the Library.

The History of Holden, Massachusetts, 1667-1841.

The first history of Holden was written by the Reverend Samuel C. Damon, a son of Holden and a brother of Susan Damon Gale, who married the founder of the Damon Memorial and Gale Free Library, Samuel C. Gale. A recent graduate of the Andover Theological Seminary, Reverend Damon was asked to deliver "an historical address" at the centennial celebration of Holden, held May 4, 1841 in the town center. His well-received address, with added notes and an appendix, became this published history.

To set the scene:

"[May 4, 1841] was remarkable in the climate of New England. Snow had fallen during the preceding week to unusual depth, and the white drifts and beds remained along the borders and covered the little hollow of the fields, and although the sun shone bright, the north-west wind was chilled with the breath of winter." (National Aegis, May 19, 1841)

From Damon's address:

"The earliest authentic accounts, on record, which refer to the tract of land now embraced within the limits of the township of Holden, are co-eval with the history of Worcester. That town originally had its North and South halves. The General Court of Massachusetts, in May, 1667, appointed a Committee 'to take an exact viewe' of lands lying in the vicinity of Quinsigamond Pond....

"[The Committee believe] it expedient, that the honored Court will be pleased to reserve [the lands] for a town, being conveniently situated, and well watered with ponds and brooks, and lying near mid-way between Boston and Springfield, about one day's journey from either. . . .

"The persons, who had obtained a grant of this tract of land from the General Court, did not consider their title as valid, until by purchase, it had been secured to them by the Indians, the original proprietors of the soil. On the 13th of July, 1674, John alias Horrawannonit, or Quiquonassett, Sagamore of Pakachoge, and Solomon alias Woonaskochu, Sagamore of Tataessit, together with the consent of their kindred and people, conveyed by deed the abovementioned tract of land . . . the broken upland and woodlands, woods, trees, rivers, brooks, ponds, swamps, meadows, mineralls, or any other thing, or things whatsoever, lying or being within that tract of land, containing eight miles square or the contents thereof, to be layd out. . . in time convenient."*

*Dated July 13, 1674, the land described in the deed would become Worcester, Holden, Auburn, and added sections of Paxton and West Boylston.





It's Not Over Yet--Five End-of-Summer Reads with Intrigue, Mystery, and Romance

The Summer Swap, the newest release from Sarah Morgan, is an emotional roller coaster about family, friendship, and forgiveness. It is the story of a summer escape to Cape Cod with heartbreak, the unraveling of long-held secrets, and chances to start over. The characters are well developed, and it's hard to put the book down.

The Lost Letters from Martha's Vineyard by Michael Callahan has a bit of intrigue and mystery. The story alternates between 1959 vintage Hollywood and modern Martha's Vineyard. Mercy Welles, a rising young actress, suddenly disappears from the Hollywood scene. Many years later her granddaughter, Kit, is packing up her grandmother's attic and discovers a box of letters. Alternating timelines between Kit and Mercy put together the puzzle pieces of Mercy's life, which contains love, betrayal, and murder.

Seven Summers by Paige Toon is a tale about the comings and goings and the risings and fallings of the relationship between Liv and Finn. Liv lives in Cornwall while Finn lives in Los Angeles near his band, aspiring to be a songwriter. They promise to see each other every summer as long as they are both unattached. And then Liv meets Tom...your heart shatters into pieces and is put back together again and again.

A Happier Life, the newest release from Kristy Woodson Harvey, takes place in Beaufort, North Carolina. Keaton Smith, the granddaughter of Rebecca and Townsend Saint James, agrees to clean out the detritus of their home so the property can be put on the market. The house on Sunset Lane has remained closed and unoccupied since their fateful disappearance in 1976 and literally feels like a museum. As Keaton gets to know her neighbors and the town folks, she begins to wonder if the stories about her grandparents that she has grown up with are true. Could there be more to the story?

15 Summers Later is the most recent book by author RaeAnne Thayne. It is set in Emerald Creek, in the panhandle of Idaho. It's an appealing story about two sisters who survive a traumatic event as teenagers that continues to affect their lives. Their ordeal changed everything, and now they must attempt to reconcile their futures and face their past. There is mystery, intrigue, and romance in this enjoyable tale.
